



Why study Politics at Formby High School?

Our lives are dominated by politics. People's everyday concerns — health, the economy, crime, education, war are all, to some extent, controlled by politicians.

The course is concerned with power and how it is distributed. You will develop the skills and knowledge needed to understand politics and the relationship between political ideas, institutions and processes.

In Year 12 you will learn about UK Government and Politics, including the UK's key institutions such as parliament, the office of Prime Minister, political parties and the UK constitution. You will also learn about what influences how people vote and the strengths and weaknesses of first past the post, the UK electoral system. In Year 13, students learn about different political beliefs and ideologies and then consider these ideologies in action. There is also a unit on US politics, which will allow you to compare and contrast with the UK.

The theoretical study of Politics is enhanced by following current affairs and having the opportunity to visit parliament.

What does the course involve?

- Unit 1: UK Politics and Core Political Ideas
- Unit 2: UK Government and Non-Core Political Ideas
- Unit 3: Comparative Politics: USA

What can the qualification lead to?
